PROGRAM HISTORY



For The University of Akron, its grand men's soccer tradition is rooted in humble beginnings that took place in 1954. A student named Stu Parry had an idea to start a soccer team after transferring to Akron from Oberlin following a two-year stint in the military.

His first call for players in 1954 was answered by 20 students. Practice started immediately and after two weeks the team started scheduling games. The team included Stu's brother, George, as a goalie, along with Harold Boughton, Jim Cunningham, Lou Michalski, Dick Patterson, Lawton Vaughn, Jim Vaughn, Bob Haver, Glen Hilbish, Jack Reed, Dick Patterson, Jerry Acuff, Jim Farkas, Tom Harmon, Larry Temo and Bob Morrison. They opened that first season with a 2-0-1 record.

With Parry's initiative, UA Athletics Director "Red" Cochrane agreed to give the sport a chance in 1955, thanks to a successful Acme-Zip game the year before making funds available for other sports.

Akron's foray into intercollegiate soccer did not start out well as the Zips dropped their first two games, finishing that inaugural season with a 2-4-1 record. Bill Cunningham had the distinction of scoring UA's very first goal in a 3-1 loss at Kenyon. It is fitting that Akron's first victory came over cross-town rival Kent State, 3-1.

That first season was not a sign of things to come as Parry directed the Zips for 15 seasons and compiled a record of 118-43-4. Parry's list of accomplishments includes nine Ohio Collegiate Soccer Association (OCSA) titles, and six NCAA playoff appearances. In 1966 and 1968 he was named Ohio Soccer Coach of the Year. Parry also served on the NCAA Rules Committee and was elected president of the National Soccer Coaches Association in 1968.

Since 1969, the four subsequent coaches have continued Parry's winning ways. Bill Killen (1970-73) directed four winning teams, including the 1971-73 squads that advanced to the NCAA Midwest Regional playoffs.

Robert Dowdy (1974-81) had the program for eight years, with seven winning seasons. His 11-2-1 squad in 1975, and well as the 1976, 1980 and 1981 teams, captured OCSA championships.

From 1982 through 1992, Steve Parker directed UA to 139 victories, 59 losses and 25 ties. His teams won six OCSA crowns and his 1983 (15-5-2), 1984 (15-2-3) and 1985 (12-5-3) teams participated in the NCAA Tournament.

However, it was in 1986 that Parker's team gave the University its most unparalleled national exposure by finishing as national runner-up. The Zips defeated Evansville (2-1), Penn State (2-1) and Fresno State en route to a national title matchup with Duke in the Tacoma Dome in Tacoma, Wash. Akron lost the title game by a 1-0 score, but that finish and the team's 17-4-3 record earned Parker the National Coach of the Year Award.

Ken Lolla, a two-time All-American and four-year letterwinner at Duke, took over the program in 1993. In 13 seasons at Akron, Lolla became the program's all-time winningest coach with a record of 160-68-25. Lolla coached the Zips to eight regular-season Mid-American Conference titles, four MAC Tournament Championships and six NCAA Tournament appearances. Akron

made the NCAA Tournament field each of Lolla's final five seasons, including 2003 when the Zips became the first-ever Mid-American Conference school to earn a seeding, capturing the No. 15 spot and a first-round bye.

In 2005 Akron became the first-ever MAC school to be ranked No. 1 in any sport, holding the nation's top spot for four weeks. The Zips posted an 18-1-4 record, setting a new school record for victories as they earned the No. 9 seed in the NCAA Tournament and advanced to the quarterfinals.

Also during Lolla's tenure, Akron placed 73 student-athletes on the All-MAC team, including a league-high 45 first-team selections.

Thanks to its rich past, Akron has cultivated a national reputation as a soccer power. Pete Milich (1960-63) stills ranks among the top 15 in the NCAA record books in 13 categories and he still holds the NCAA record for consecutive games with a goal scored (16). Akron's 1960

scoring average of 5.73 still ranks fifth in NCAA history, while its 1961 mark of 5.21 points per game ranks 10th.

Since 1957, Zips players have earned 34 first-team All-America designations, including three-time honorees Fritz Kungl and Richard Parkinson. Thirty-two former players have gone on to the professional ranks, including Cameron Knowles who in 2005, became the first UA player to be drafted by an MLS team when Real Salt Lake selected him in the fourth round of the MLS Supplemental Draft.

Other highlights in the history of Akron soccer include:

1961- Defeated defending NCAA Champion St. Louis, 3-2, at the Rubber Bowl in front of 10,000 spectators as part of the Acme-Zip spectacular. That season five of 11 All-Ohio selections were from Akron.

1962- Pete Milich scores a school-record seven goals in one game as the Zips defeat Frostburg State, 9-4.

1966- Akron finishes the season with a 10-3-0 mark, the first of 26-straight .500 or better seasons. That streak was snapped by 1992's 9-10-0 mark, one of just three losing seasons in the Zips' 51-year history.

1968- The Zips were a perfect 11-0 in the regular season until a loss to Michigan State in the NCAA Midwest playoff. Earlier that year they had beaten the defending national champion Spartans by a 4-1 score at Lee Jackson Field. That win snapped MSU's 33-game win streak and UA was the first team to score a goal on the Spartans that season.

1969- Jim Malcom (1967-68) becomes the first Akron player to enter the professional ranks, playing with the Baltimore Comets in 1969.

1970- Faced No. 1 Saint Louis in the first round of the NCAA Tournament.

1972- Advanced to the third round of the NCAA College Division championships, losing to eventual national champion SIU-Edwardsville, 3-2 at Lee Jackson Field



1974- Defeated Buffalo State, 6-1, led by a hat trick from George Nanchoff. Nanchoff scored two of his goals within 15 seconds of each other in the opening half. It was the first victory for first-year head coach Robert Dowdy.

1975- Akron was ranked No. 10 nationally, earning the school's 11th Ohio Collegiate Soccer Association (OCSA) championship. Dowdy was named the Ohio and Midwest College Coach of the Year as the Zips finished with an 11-2-1 record. In a 10-0 win over Cincinnati to open the season, brothers George and Louie Nanchoff scored four goals each.

1977- Louie Nanchoff spent the summer of 1977 playing with the U.S. national team as it prepared for the 1980 Summer Olympics trials.

1978- Louie Nanchoff passed up his final year at Akron to turn professional with the Colorado Caribou of the North American Soccer League. That made 1978 the first season in five years where a Nanchoff did not play at the school.

1983- Akron defeats UW-Green Bay by a 7-0 score in the NCAA playoffs before falling to Indiana, 2-1 in overtime. That begins a string of four-straight NCAA appearances for the Zips.

1998- Akron wins its first Mid-American Conference Tournament champion-

ship and earns an automatic berth in the NCAA Tournament. It was the Zips' first NCAA appearance since the 1986 season when they finished as national runners-up.

2001- The Zips become the first school in Mid-American Conference history to earn an at-large berth in the NCAA Tournament.

2003- Akron finished the year ranked fourth in the nation in shutout percentage (59 percent) and fourth in goals against average (0.58), advancing to the round of 16 in the NCAA Tournament.

2004- Ken Lolla becomes the program's all-time winningest coach, recording his 140th victory at Akron with the Zips' 1-0 win over Bowling Green on Nov. 5. Akron went on to win its third Mid-American Conference Tournament title and made its fourth-straight NCAA Tournament appearance.

2005- UA set a new school record for victories with an 18-1-4 mark. Akron became the first team in Mid-American Conference history to earn a No. 1 ranking in any sport, holding the top spot for four weeks. The Zips advanced to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Tournament before falling to eventual champion Maryland in a shoot-out. Akron had a league-record seven first-team All-MAC picks, and Ross McKenzie (first team), Yohann Mauger (first team) and Sinisa Ubiparipovic (second team) earned All-America honors. The Zips also led the nation in scoring, goals-against average and win percentage.

2007- Under the direction of second-year head coach Caleb Porter, the No. 23 Zips post their fourth-highest win total in school history (15) en route to MAC regular-season and tournament championships. With a 15-4-2 overall record, UA records the highest winning percentage in the nation, going 45-10-7 (.782), from 2005-'07. Porter was named MAC Coach of the Year while three players earned All-America honors: Corey Sipos (third team), Anthony Ampaipitakwong (all-freshman team) and Steve Zakuani (all-freshman team).

1982

Steve Parker is named the fourth head coach in school history. He takes over the program from Robert Dowdy, who coached the Zips from 1975-81.

1986

2007

THE ZIPS CLAIM THEIR 10TH REGULAR-SEASON MAC TITLE IN 15 SEASONS AND THEIR FIFTH LEAGUE TOURNAMENT CHAMPIONSHIP, THE MOST BY ANY CONFERENCE MEMBER.

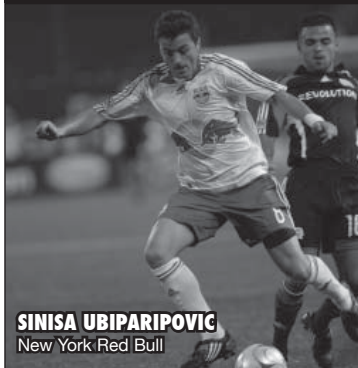

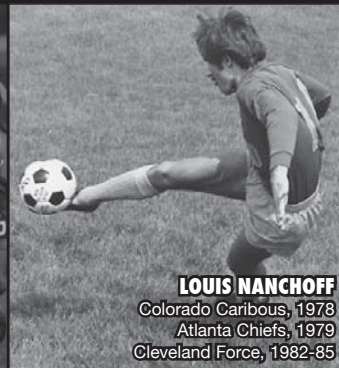
